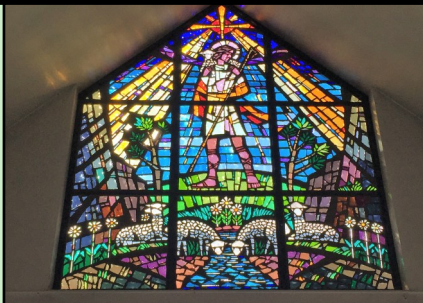

*Dear Friends,*

Perhaps the people of Good Shepherd would write a foreword to the book?

Through it all, Beth demonstrated her love for the church. She came with compassion and a positive spirit. She was always ready to lend a hand, whether it was in her job description or not.

As you formally leave our employ, Beth, thank you from all of us for a job well done. You might write a book entitled, *Leaves from the Notebook of a Faithful Servant*, which could help others understand and process what a life of faith can hold for the person who says, "Here I Am, Lord." ## A PATRIOTIC TEA PARTY



Good Shepherd's USA  
 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary

Committee will open the Semiquincentennial (250 years) celebration of our nation's Independence with a Patriot Tea (and coffee) Party. The old-fashioned social will be held on Sunday, February 1 from 2 p.m. until 4 p.m. in All Saints Hall. Good Shepherd members and their guests are invited to share in this special day in honor of the Boston Tea Party, which actually occurred on December 16, 1773. The party will feature English and herbal teas (and coffee for those more rebellious colonists among us) as well as a variety of tea sandwiches, scones and petite desserts. In addition, entertainment will include a brief program and music from the Revolutionary War period. Period costumes or red-white-blue dress are not necessary but are encouraged.

Looking ahead, the anniversary committee plans to host special events for Flag Day (June 14, 1777), Independence Day (Saturday, July 4, 1776), and Peace Day (September 3, 1783).

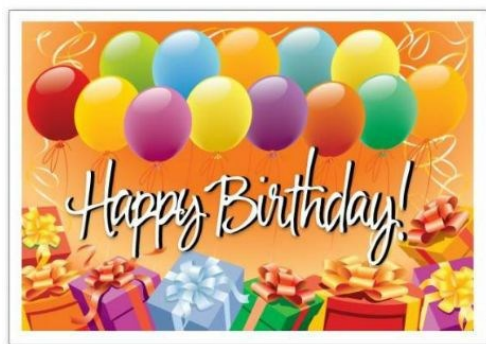

## Thank you, Good Shepherd

Dear Friends,

Thank you so much for your heartfelt farewell and Godspeed to me as I leave my position here at Good Shepherd. My family and I were blessed by your hospitality on January 11. Thank you for the beautiful luncheon and for your prayers in worship. And, thank you for your generosity—I have been deeply touched by the personal messages you've shared and gifts you have given me.

I am leaving Good Shepherd 5 weeks shy of what would have been the sixth anniversary of my being hired. I had fully intended to work here until I was ready for retirement. Despite my being an old Presbyterian who was not up to speed on your lingo—proper, ciborium, alb, chausuble, etc.—or Lutheran polity...and, even though I was loud and clear in my interview that after God my family was my main priority, you took a chance and invited me to join your staff. You warmly welcomed me, and my family. You invited me to worship with you on Wednesday mornings, during my work hours. While I was hired to support Pastor Baker with administrative needs, she has treated me as a valued colleague. Early on, Council adjusted the office schedule at my request, which made it easier for me to juggle work and family responsibilities. You have brought me treats to share with my family—you've been especially generous at Christmas—and, you walked with me when my father died last year. Good Shepherd is a most special congregation, where the love of Christ is palpable and you are truly living as the eyes, ears, hands, feet, and voice of Jesus in all places.

But God has called me to do a new thing. I am so grateful for the love and encouragement you all have shared with me when, in 2024, I began seminary coursework and training to become a Commissioned Ruling Elder. I leave you to undertake a paid pastoral internship with Big Spring Presbyterian Church, after which I will be eligible to be commissioned to serve a congregation within Carlisle Presbytery as a lay pastor—hopefully as early as May. My time here has been key in discerning God's call. I've learned so much from Pastor Baker and from all of you, and it has been a great privilege to serve with you. I am on the path I'm on now in large part because of all of you and your faithful witness. And, I am so very grateful that although I will no longer be a member of my staff, my family will always have another church home here at Good Shepherd.

So...until we meet again, may God keep you in the palm of his hand.

Churchwide Women of the ELCA has a yearly Conference of Presidents every February. This year the conference will be February 22, 2026. It's a time for all synod presidents to come together to meet and learn. We focus on Bible study, business and budget items as well as Gather, Triennial Gathering, promotions, membership and resources. We used to meet in person in Chicago. After Covid, we now meet by Zoom.

This year's theme is “WISDOM and WORTH”. As requested in last year's event evaluations, we will have 3 workshop learning sessions. The first will be on Racial Justice. The second will be on 2SLGBTQIA+. The Third session will be a choice of 7 different topics.

Women of the ELCA has been about racial justice since we started a “Today's Dream; Tomorrow's Reality” (TDTR) program in 1997. Each synod sent 2 people to Chicago to be trained. We were to then return home to share our program with our synod and church women. We are now in the process of reorganizing. At the last Triennial Gathering in Phoenix, AZ, we asked for anyone interested to attend a meeting. In no time, we were standing room only. We signed up to become part of a new WELCA movement for racial justice. We're just getting started with new leadership. “for such a time as this”.

As a past synodical president, I have been blessed to serve on the Churchwide President's Planning Committee for the past 2 years. I look forward to sharing our thoughts and ideas from our conference.

### Lutheran World Relief

Traditionally, when we think of Lutheran World Relief (LWR) we think of their global mission and helping wherever there is a need throughout the world. Last year, **LWR began assisting those in need after disasters in the United States.** Last year, they **aided victims of Hurricanes Helene and Milton, victims of the wildfires in California, those across the South and Midwest and flood victims in Texas. Victims were aided in 12 states with 21 shipping containers of quilts and kits and over \$1 million in cash grants.** There are **2 brochures** on the bulletin board in the breezeway showing the distribution of materials and money in 2025.

**Prayer Shawl Ministry** joins us on the **second Tuesday of each month.** Feel free to drop in and join us at any time, either for knitting/crocheting on Tuesday mornings or to help with needed items for the community at large.


