# Call

*Dear People of Good Shepherd,*

Several years ago, I drove up Wilhelm Road and proceeded alongside the church building to come around to the parking lot. To my surprise, there were several men sitting on the patio area outside of the Christian Education Wing, just down from the entrance to the St. Mary's Chapel. They were conversing and drinking coffee. They were smiling and laughing.

It was a beautiful late spring/early summer day. The sun was shining, but it wasn't too hot. The breeze was soft. And, the birds were sweetly singing.

"Was there a meeting of the property committee that I missed?" "What is this gathering of men at this early hour of the morning?" "Is there a men's group at Good Shepherd that I don't know about?" These are but some of the questions that I pondered while I parked my car.

I approached the friendly group with a good morning and a smile. They thought nothing of making space for me to join them. Soon, I learned that the reason for this gathering was that they had just moved the heavy benches up from the winter storage spot down in the All Saints Hall, and if you've moved the heavy benches, you get to sit on them and enjoy a moment of fellowship and rest.

It turns out that there was a men's group, but not under such an organized name. The lack of formal organization wasn't always the case. In 1950, the men of Good Shepherd met.

Soon after that, a Luther League (youth group) was formed. Good Shepherd's youth had regular meetings and retreats. They engaged in educational opportunities and a whole lot of fun and fellowship.

Then in 1958, the women of Good Shepherd organized a chapter of the United Lutheran Church Women of America. In a time when women were not allowed to serve on the congregation council (nonetheless be pastors), this chapter gave space for the women to have theological discussions. It also gave space for women to have influence on financial matters that were of great concern to them.

The early years made room for men, women, and youth to receive a place within the congregation. These places lifted up voices and cares and concerns for all involved. God's work in this place brought these various groups together under one name – Good Shepherd.



Inez, our W/ELCA Churchwide Racial Justice trainer, advocate, mentor, and friend, gave us a book list. When she retired, she mentioned that no one had completed reading the list. Yes, I'm a reader and felt upset with myself. Then, I realized I had probably read even more books about racism than were on the list. One of my favorites is a book that I liked to gift. It's entitled, *HEALING—A Journal of Tolerance and Understanding* by Muhammad Ali and Thomas Hauser. My favorite quote from the book is by Jonathan Swift, "We have just enough religion to make us hate, but not enough to make us love one another." Another by Martin Luther King, Jr. says, "He who hates does not love God." The last quote is biblical, from the First Epistle of John, 4: 22, "If a man says, 'I love God,' and hateth his neighbor, he is a liar."

According to the FBI, hate crimes are at the highest level in 12 years. Just read or watch the news.

Race, religion, ethnicity, sexual orientation are all reasons why Americans have been taught to hate.

Recently, religious hatred has declined, and gender hatred has increased. June is PRIDE month. It has to be traumatic for our children especially with laws introduced and passed about who can play or compete in sports. I read an article about 11 year old children who formed a soccer team. It's on NPR. They would not be able to play legitimately, but they formed a team anyway. It has boys and girls playing on the same team. They are learning how to play, and their community allowed them to compete. There is joy for them to play and for those who watch. They recently scored a goal! Although they lost 12-1, it didn't matter. They scored a goal! ALL children should be able to have fun. Children should be able to be happy and not be traumatized for who they are. Who are we to judge?

Yes, this is supposed to be a July article, but Juneteenth must also be mentioned. July is about freedom and patriotism, so there is a connection. It's the second national anniversary celebration.

Juneteenth is a time to celebrate the emancipation of slavery in certain parts of the United States. It's about Texas 157 years ago. Actually, freedom is still not happening for many in America. I remember

the quote, "The North won the war, but the South won the narrative." Yes, the Bible says, "The truth shall set you free." What is the truth? Why now are those in power trying to suppress our history of slavery?

I remember when in 1997, I returned home after my first W/ELCA Racial Justice training. No one wanted to listen and learn. When the Church and Society Synod Committee held a 2 day workshop on Racism for synod pastors, it did not go over well. It was almost a 50-50 split. Comments ranged from, "Why are we doing this?" to "It was a waste of time," to "Please continue," to "This really must be addressed."

Now, the synod is all about racial justice training. During COVID, I participated in the synod's Zoom presentations. During breakout sessions, I learned many pastors felt an unwillingness among those sitting in the pews to listen and learn about racism. So I practically stood up and shouted recently when during my Zoom worship service, I heard Pastor Baker mention racism in her sermons. I also was happy when Pastor Martha Boyd spoke about Juneteenth and our need to open our hearts, minds, and spirit to transform us. To not let the prejudice, violence, and hatred attacks we see stop us from being a witness to God's love. We can't be silent or fearful. We must heal and restore justice and peace to ALL people.

I remember when racial and gender issues divided our Lutheran church. Maybe for some, we are still divided. I remember when W/ELCA apologized for having speakers at our triennial tell their stories about a son's journey as a homosexual and how she found love and acceptance. We heard apologies the next day for the speakers who talked about this issue because that's not what was requested. My friend and I were deeply upset that an apology was given. It was to be my last triennial, enough. I've gone to more. But, I see change. I see more of us willing to "love our neighbors." More of us willing to witness, more of us willing to live out our baptism, and more of us willing to show lovingkindness.

## Lutheran Disaster Response Eastern European Crisis UPDATE

The United Nations reports that over 6.5 million people have left the Ukraine, and an additional 7 million are displaced within the country. Your gifts to Lutheran Disaster Response have already been at work as we continue to respond to this crisis.

One inspiring ministry you support is Mandák House, a church in Budapest, Hungary, with a long history of helping vulnerable populations, especially the Roma people in the area. Like many of our partners, Mandák House has watched its response to the refugee crisis evolve. The people of Ukraine now need a different kind of support, beyond immediate relief supplies. Staff and volunteers at Mandák House are helping refugees place their children in schools, find jobs, take language classes, access the health care system and integrate into the community.

“With different phases, you have to be flexible and change your focus,” said the Rev. Márta Bolba, pastor of Mandák House. “We are really flexible and needs-oriented. We should continue this flexibility because people need different things in different phases of the war.”

# 2022 Assembly Happenings

- Joined in devotions led by Deacon Margaret Folkemer-Leonard, assembly chaplain.
- Praised God through a Service of the Word with the Necrology.
- Remembered the following rostered ministers who died since the last assembly in 2021: The Rev. David W. Clark; the Rev. Marshall H. Gante; the Rev. Richard E. Geib; the Rev. E. Edward Keyser; the Rev. William C. Knotts; the Rev. L. Guy Mehl; the Rev. Raymond A. Sistik; the Rev. Martin L. Swartz; and Deacon James H. Wise.
- Welcomed the Rev. Dr. Roger Willer as our churchwide representative.
- Honored the Rev. Beth Martini, assistant to the bishop, for ten years of ordained ministry.
- Launched the annual Generosity Appeal, designated this year for youth ministry.
- Considered memorials regarding restructuring the ELCA, divesting of Russian assets, and upholding the Office of Ministry for all rostered ministers.
- Elected members of the Synod Council and a board member for Susquehanna University.
- Blessed and sent the Voting Members of the 2022 Churchwide Assembly.
- Amended synod bylaws.
- Enjoyed mission videos from a variety of agencies and ministries.
- Installed the newly-elected members of the Synod Council and newly-elected conference secretaries.
- Blessed and sent Bishop Dunlop on sabbatical later this summer.
- Rejoiced to have finished the work of the synod assembly ahead of schedule.

# 2022 Assembly Actions

- \* Adopted the agenda and Rules of Procedure.
- \* Adopted the proposed budget for FY 2023 of \$2,320,000.
- \* Adopted the beginning minimum base salary and housing allowance for 2023 of \$57,760 for ministers of Word and Sacrament who serve full time at the time of their ordination and the beginning minimum salary for 2023 when housing is provided of \$40,185 for ministers of Word and Sacrament who serve full time at the time of their ordination.
- \* Adopted the beginning minimum salary for 2023 of \$53,865 for ministers of Word and Service who serve full time at the time of their ordination.
- \* Elected Synod Council members: Debra Barrett, the Rev. Angela Hammer, Hallie McCoy, Andrea Oslikova, the Rev. Ben Siebert, and Evan Williams.
- \* Amended bylaw S11.05.01. to make the language agree with the *Audit Committee Charter*, a policy of this synod, and assure the independence of the committee.
- \* Added bylaw S7.26.01. to establish the process by which baptized and confirmed members of synod-authorized worshiping communities may be certified as voting members of synod assemblies.
- \* Added bylaw S7.27.01. to establish the process by which a minister of Word and Sacrament from a church body with which a relationship of full communion has been declared and established by the Churchwide Assembly of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America may by the Synod Council be granted the privilege of both voice and vote in the Synod Assembly during the period of that minister's service in a congregation of this church.
- \* Amended bylaws S12.04.01., S12.04.02., and S12.04.03. to permit both ministers of Word and Service (deacons) and ministers of Word and Sacrament (pastors) to serve as conference dean and secretary.
