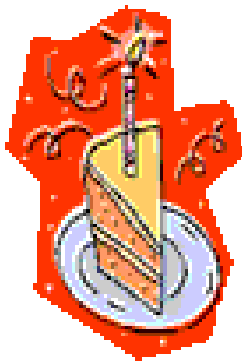

## Good Shepherd Lenten Project: Personal Care Kits



Lutheran World Relief has reached out to local congregations concerning the urgent need for Personal Care Kits. We prepare these for In-Gathering in the Fall every year, but they are asking that these be collected during Lent and sent to them NOW instead of holding them until the Fall. We will send additional kits if items are donated between now and then. Each **Personal Care Kit** consists of: **1 light-weight bath towel** (20" X 40" to 27" X 50"—dark color recommended) , **2 or 3 bath-size bars of soap equaling 8-9 ounces** (any brand in original wrapping), **1 adult-sized toothbrush**, **1 sturdy comb** (no picks or fine-toothed combs), and **1 pair of metal nail clippers** (attached file optional). **Money to help cover shipping costs** may be placed in an envelope marked **Personal Care Kits** and placed in the offering plate. Items may be placed in the designated tubs in the Breezeway or the Narthex. The deadline for donations will be Easter Sunday—April 9. # Women of the ELCA JUST LOVE: And (our Triennial theme)

**“HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO YOU  
HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO YOU  
HAPPY BIRTHDAY...”**

*I just never understood  
How a man who died for good  
Could not have a day that would  
Be set aside for his recognition...*

*Why has there never been a holiday  
Where peace is celebrated  
All throughout the world*

*The time is overdue  
For people like you and me  
Who know the way to truth  
Is love and unity  
to all God's children...*

Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated in 1968 at the age of 39. This year would be his 94th birthday. In an NPR article, “Biden becomes the first sitting president to deliver a sermon Sunday at Ebenezer Baptist Church in Atlanta” by Giuliano Haywood, MLK is remembered as a “non-violent warrior for justice, who followed the word, and the way of his Lord and his Savior.”

In writing this article it's a continuing commitment to being an advocate for racial justice. It's a promise made in 1997 at a Chicago W/ELCA Training Event, the first of many through the years. Yes, it's about “making some noise.”

In Diane Bernard's BBC article, “Martin Luther King Day: The song that changed the US,” I learned about Stevie Wonder's efforts to create a federal National holiday for MLK. Since he was 13, he's been an advocate for social justice issues. This “Happy Birthday” song was written in 1980. On January 15, 1981 at the National Mall in Washington D.C., Stevie Wonder with Diane Ross, Gladys Knight, and Gil Scott Heron were on stage in front of an audience

of 50,000 to begin the campaign for a MLK Federal Holiday. Stevie Wonder put his life on pause for 3 years while he toured, rallied, and marched to finally get this to happen. This year marks the 40th anniversary of MLK Day. It was 13 years later a bill was introduced in Congress but was blocked by Southern Democrats and Conservative Republicans. Stevie Wonder shared his dream with Scott King and together with others lobbied politicians. They brought a 6 million signature petition to Congress. In January 1983 he attended a special legislative hearing. By November 1983, a bill was signed into law. This was celebrated on TV with other Motown artists, also another historic moment.

From the age of 13 with his song, “Fingertips” (about black youth marching and getting hose sprayed) he was about “making music a forum for black political concerns and from a black perspective.” The late '60's and '70's were a “disastrous era for activists” Stevie Wonder, Marvin Gaye and others wrote songs and albums to let people know the stories and trauma. Yes, there's a long history of a diverse group of artists and their music telling America's story for all.

This year was different for MLK Day. Instead of going to a Christian Churches United church service and panel discussion (we didn't plan one for this year) and then participating in some kind of community service project, I read almost every article I could find. This is the last article to share some thoughts. Oseye Boyd in the Indianapolis Star wrote, “Do you know who MLK, Jr. really was? Honor the radical not the dreamer.” She writes about how he was mistreated, threatened,

called “communist,” arrested and jailed. He was nonviolent, a radical, revolutionary, and a drum major for justice, peace, and righteousness. When white religious leaders raised concern and caution about his tactics, in 1963, he responded, “You deplore the demonstrations that are presently taking place in Birmingham, but I am sorry that your statements did not express a similar concern for the conditions that brought the demonstrations into being....” He then said, “But as I continued to think about the matter, I gradually gained a bit of satisfaction from being considered an extremist. Was not Jesus an extremist in love? ‘Love your enemy, bless them that curse you, pray for them that despite fully use you.’” She wants MLK to be remembered not as a passive dreamer, but as a man of action. He was an advocate for justice. “Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere.”

I remember reading that there was a backlash to LBJ's policies. We are witnessing a backlash to Obama's policies. That seems to be a pattern. As a mother and teacher in the 60's and 70's, and as a grandmother and advocate now, what we're witnessing is worse.

We have the greatest commandment, yet we struggle to practice it. A favorite quote: “We have just enough religion to make us hate one another, but not enough to make us love one another.” —Jonathan Swift (1667-1745), Irish poet and satirist

February is Black History month and a time to celebrate Valentine's Day.

I'm reminded of another song, “You've Got To Be Carefully Taught”:



# MLK's Legacy

*You've got to be carefully taught  
to hate and fear  
You've got to be taught  
from year to year  
It's got to be drummed  
in your dear little ear  
You've got to be carefully taught.*

What about changing that to:

*You must be taught  
that God is love  
You must be taught  
from year to year...*

I remember in my home my mother listened to who I called "the hateful mouth" for 3 hours every day. Then when I would take my parents to their appointments, the TV in these places would always have a certain channel, I would ask if they minded changing the channel. They would switch to another show. I'll never forget going to the dentist. There in front of my face was the TV, the same channel was on. When I asked them to switch channels, they asked if they could turn it off. YES! Now, we have Social Media. It's addictive and almost impossible to turn off. I don't go there. We're programmed. It's scary. Especially when you can find your own truth. You can be "carefully taught."

The ELCA is working on "A Social Message on Government and Civil Engagement: Discipleship in a Democracy." It's a process. It started in 2019 and will finish in 2025. Check it out.

Let's celebrate this February. Join us for W/ELCA's annual Thankoffering Service February 19.

And remember to "JUST LOVE."
