Dear people of Good Shepherd,

Simul Iustus et Peccator

We are simultaneously saint and sinner.

Luther writes, “thus a Christian man is righteous and a sinner at the same time, holy and profane, an enemy of God and a child of God.” (LW 26:232)

Luther goes on to relate this truth to how Christians need the Church. We confess our sins, and we hear that we are loved by God through the hearing of the scriptures and receiving the gifts of Baptism and Holy Communion. We name our failures and we are strengthened by grace to live each and every day.

Why am I writing about this? You are already more than aware that we are marking the 250th anniversary of the Declaration of Independence. You are also more than aware that this anniversary is surrounded by an array of attitudes.

As your pastor, I am hearing everything from calls to do more celebrating, to calls to do nothing for the anniversary, to calls for repenting of the history of these United States.

I hear these positions. I take them into my prayers. I am led time and time again back to *Simul Iustus et Peccator*.

I can think of no funeral or memorial service where the deceased was all good or all bad. I can think of no birthday party where the person of honor was all good or all bad. I can think of no wedding anniversary where the couple was all good or all bad.

The truth is, in all circumstances, it is both. Everyone has their flaws, and everyone has their shining spots. We cannot separate one from the other.

This is how I see this anniversary. I see the five freedoms of the First Amendment: speech, press, religion, assembly, and petitioning the government, as well as the rest of the Constitution. I see and lament how Indigenous People and Africans and other minority groups have been and are treated.

Through this, I look with hope that we will mark this time with a clear vision that as a country we are both wonderful AND in need of healing, that we can see where we can do better and that we will commit ourselves to doing just that...better.

This hope extends beyond our country to the entire world. We unite in praying that God’s blessings will be upon us and all people. We sing [This Is My Song](#) (ELW 887):

This is my song, O God of all the nations, a song of peace for lands afar and mine. This is my home, the country where my heart is; here are my hopes, my dreams, my holy shrine; but other hearts in other lands are beating with hopes and dreams as true and high as mine.

It's Time to Think About Advent!

(*Perhaps more appropriately, it's time for the members of Good Shepherd to start thinking about Advent!) In 2025, we tried something new for Advent. Rather than ordering a devotional booklet from a publisher, we created our own. Members of the congregation wrote stories, shared memories, offered commentaries, reflected on scripture – all relating to the season of Advent. Some devotionals were a paragraph, others spanned several pages, and ALL helped us learn something important about the authors and ALL deepened and enhanced our journey through the Advent Season. Because the devotional booklet was so well-received, we are doing it again for 2026! A devotional entry is needed for each day of Advent. Inspiration for your entry can come from a variety of sources:



- Scripture texts assigned for that day
- Traditional themes of Advent – waiting, watching, preparing, the coming of the Light
- The 4 Advent candles on the Advent wreath: HOPE, PEACE, JOY, LOVE
- A favorite scripture that reminds you of Advent
- A personal experience

The compilation of this booklet is a time-consuming process but well worth the effort. Consequently, entries for this year's Advent devotional need to be submitted by August 9, 2026. Your submission should include your name, a title, and a scripture reference if applicable, and then email it to the church – goodshepherdpxtang@gmail.com. Start thinking now. In the coming weeks, a list of the assigned Scripture texts will be

placed in the Narthex and outside the Chapel entrance. Some people may choose to use these scripture texts while others may not. A sign-up sheet will also be made available. Last year, some of the writers selected a specific date because their Advent memory was tied to a birthday, anniversary, or special event. Please consider sharing your Advent message with your church family – a booklet written for us by us. Vicki Delp

FAMILY PROMISE NEWS

Family Promise currently is hosting 10 guests. There are 2 families that are both making progress in the program. The father in the first family has secured 2 jobs, obtained a car, and the family has secured day care for the youngest children which will allow the mother to also seek employment. The second family has one parent working and the other is seeking transfer to a closer location with their previous employer.

FP does not have host sites for all weeks. If a church has not scheduled to host, that week is considered an "Open Week." FP has sites that they can utilize for overnight for the open weeks. However, they are currently looking for van drivers to transport the guests to/from the overnight site. This would entail picking up the van at the Day Center (56 Erford Rd., Camp Hill) and transporting the guests to the overnight site and returning them to the Day Center in the morning. This is a PAID position and it would be on an "as needed" basis. The driver would be paid \$20 per trip. If interested, please contact Stacey Coldren, Network Director, at 717-737-1100.

Our next host week is July 12-19. We still have openings for overnight hosts, meal preparers, and van drivers. Please contact Georgia if you might be available to help that week.

2026 LSS Assembly Digest of Actions

Pastor Baker, Vicki Delp, and Don Lausch attended synod assembly. They are available to answer questions regarding the assembly.

The 39th Lower Susquehanna Synod gathered under the theme, “Confluence in Christ.” Voting members poured water from bodies throughout the synod into a basin reminding us of our connection through the living water of Jesus Christ.

- Bishop Stephen R. Herr opened his first assembly as bishop with Service of the Word and Installation of newly elected Conference Deans and Secretaries. Those newly elected deans are: The Rev. Shawn M. Berkebile, Hanover Conference; and the Rev. DeAnn R. Books, North York Conference. Those newly elected secretaries are: The Rev. Katerine R.L.B. Brantner, South York Conference; the Rev. Rosalie V. Brunner, Chambersburg Conference; the Rev. Gregory B. Lindsey, Upper Dauphin Conference; the Rev. Deborah A. Mahady, North York Conference; the Rev. Jason P. Northridge, Hanover Conference; the Rev. Althea D. Seidel, Lebanon Conference; and the Rev. Jennifer L. Toburen, Perry Conference.
- Joined in hymn and prayer led by Deacon Kristen Barnes and Pastor Andrew Berdahl, assembly chaplains, and accompanied on piano by Synod Council member, Danielle Erdley.
- Welcomed the Rev. Dr. Eric D. Barreto, Weyerhaeuser Associate Professor of New Testament at Princeton Theological Seminary, as keynote speaker. Dr. Barreto presented on the Imaginations of Acts and the Gospel of Luke. He opened up the Holy Scriptures to the assembly with his inspiring presentations.
- Welcomed Mary B. Campbell, Director for AMMPARO of the ELCA as churchwide representative, and received her greetings and a report on our shared ministry through the ELCA.
- Received ecumenical greetings from Monsignor Edward Quinlan, Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia for the Roman Catholic Diocese of Harrisburg. Received video greetings from Bishop Geoffrey Mwachaba and Pastor Emmanuel Mchomvu of the Konde Diocese (ELCT); Bishop Stacie Fidler, Northern Illinois Synod (ELCA); and Lieutenant Commander Pastor David Sensenig, US Navy Chaplain Corps, ELCA Military Chaplain, aboard the USS Fort Lauderdale.
- Established slates of nominees for the Synod Council and Susquehanna University board member.
- Enjoyed learning opportunities through a variety of forums and affinity groups gathering during lunch. • Recognized rostered ministers celebrating 50 years of ordained ministry in 2026, those new to our synod, those ordained since last assembly, those retired since the last assembly, and the candidates for rostered ministry in our candidacy process.
- Remembered the following rostered ministers who died since the last assembly in 2025: The Rev. Martin J. Carlson; the Rev. Ivan R. Mechtly Jr.; the Rev. Conrad Bomberger Youse; the Rev. Dr. Ellis Gordon Ross; the Rev. Emil J. Engelman; the Rev. Eugene Lamar Shiffer; the Rev. Irene Anna Greta Friberg-Dussaq; the Rev. Dr. Martha Bernice

Sheaffer; the Rev. Dr. Guy Shannon Edmiston Jr., Bishop Emeritus; the Rev. Kenneth Reid Jetto; the Rev. Albert Edwin Myers; the Rev. Dr. William Q. Stickley; and the Rev. Gale M. Gregor.

- Enjoyed mission videos from a variety of agencies and ministries.
- Ordained Kimberly Rose Todd as a minister of word and sacrament. • Installed the newly elected members of the Synod Council.
- Received an update on the 2026 Memorial Blanket Initiative, including opportunities to make blankets and participate in a backpack collection for people experiencing homelessness.
- Received Bishop Herr's report emphasizing the important role of rostered ministers, lay leaders, children and youth in the life of our synod; the value of our ecumenical partnerships; the need for increased and accelerated collaboration among congregations, and the significance of advocacy and justice ministries across the synod. Assistants to the Bishop Pastor Beth Martini, Deacon Marsha Roscoe, and Charlie Roberts provided important insights and updates regarding the synod's mobility ministry, stewardship, wellness, campus ministry, and ministry with and for children, youth, and young adults.
- Rejoiced to have finished the work of the synod assembly ahead of schedule.

Amended and adopted the rules of procedure and agenda as recommended by the Synod Council.

Adopted the 2027 minimum salary guidelines for Ministers of Word and Sacrament and Ministers of Word and Service.

Elected to the Synod Council: The Rev. Christopher J. Suehr, the Rev. Alexis K. Sheppard-Witt; Danielle R. Erdley; Chuck J. Bissell; and Lisa M. Dubay.

Elected to the Susquehanna University board: The Rev. Shawn M. Berkebile.

Adopted amendments indicated from the Churchwide Assembly to provisions S8.51., S8.52., S1.21., S9.02., S11.04., S7.26., S9.04., S10.05., S13.40., and S13.41.

Adopted the addition of provision S10.06. related to the Synod Council and renumbered subsequent provisions.

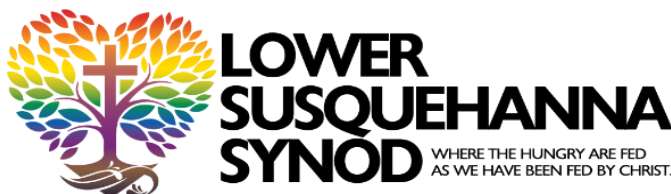
Adopted revision of bylaw S9.08.01. related to restricted ballots.

Substituted bylaw S11.01.04. related to the Committee(s) on Candidacy.

Adopted the Fiscal Year 2027-28 budget of \$2,321,475.97.
