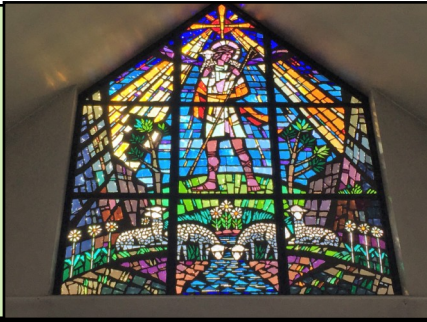

## *Dear People of Good Shepherd,*

The time is here. Preparations have been made. The “red carpet” is ready to be rolled out for our friends in faith. Good Shepherd is celebrating 75 years of ministry!

I’ve written to you about when the congregation started; the various groups that have existed within Good Shepherd; some reflection on the church building; and our laudable list of seminarians that have joined us on our journey of faith.

To wrap up this miniseries of anniversary newsletter articles, I turn towards our music. In celebration of the merger between Zion and Good Shepherd, we were offered a hymn, *My Shepherd, You Supply My Need*, composed by Matt Blaisse. A reflection of Psalm 23, it gave a 3/4 flowing piece to hear the familiar words in a new way.

Going further in to my time with you, it was my second weekend of supply preaching at Good Shepherd in 2008 and it was the fourth Sunday of Easter. It was Good Shepherd Sunday. At no other point in all of my preaching do I ever recall the weight that was present that day. I was keenly aware of the difficulty of the pastoral transition. And every pastor that preaches in the Nave is keenly aware of the vibrant Good Shepherd window that floods its colors into the worship space.

As we moved through the liturgy on that day, we reached the sending hymn, and that’s when I encountered your very own *Good Shepherd, By Your Name*. This hymn was written for your 50th anniversary by Herb Fowler. At that time, Herb was your cantor, now he is our Cantor Emeritus.

***Good Shepherd, by your name you stand,  
With goodness, mercy in your hand.  
Now come, Good Shepherd, call our name  
That we may know you are the same  
Who called our parents through the years  
To faithful journey without fears.  
We hear you voice; We follow near. Alleluia!***

***Good Shepherd, you your promise keep,  
Laid down your life to save your sheep.  
Now come, Good Shepherd, help us know  
Your promises forever grow  
Abundantly, to keep a place  
Within God’s house, to see His face.  
We follow you, hope in your grace. Alleluia!***

***Good Shepherd, you a feast prepare  
With quiet waters flowing there.  
Now come, Good Shepherd, feed your sheep,  
And lead us through your waters deep,  
Where life is love-filled all our days  
As we, one flock, our voices raise  
To follow you, singing your praise. Alleluia!***

We call our Lord and Savior the Good Shepherd. Seventy-five years ago, a group of people decided to call this congregation Good Shepherd. You catch the overtones of both in Herb’s lyrics. We worship the Good Shepherd. And, as we live as eyes, ears, hands, feet, and voice of Jesus in all place – we are the presence of the Good Shepherd in this world.

A catered dinner will be held in All Saints Hall following worship. A celebration program with special guests and sharing of fond (and funny) remembrances follows dinner.

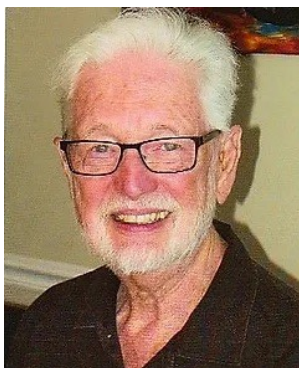

## Celebrates 75 Years of Mission and Ministry!

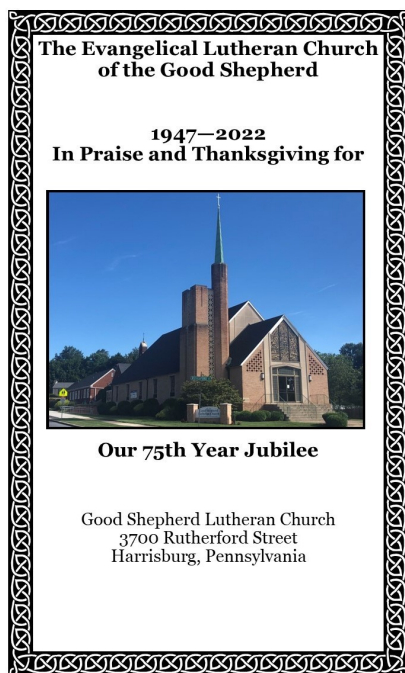


Herb Fowler, Good Shepherd Cantor Emeritus, shares this fond memory:

"My first memory of Good Shepherd was the day Pastor Sobers called me and asked me to play a Psalm Sunday liturgy, the Easter Vigil and the liturgies for Easter Day. Sara Yeagy (the beloved organist at Good Shepherd for many years) was in the hospital and needed a substitute. I agreed, but I was both excited and terrified because I had never played a liturgical service before. I was facing three different settings of very elaborate liturgies. I will never forget my amazement with the parade of acolytes, candles, priests, assisting ministers and a lot of other people passing by the organ console.

"I felt called to Good Shepherd, that is, God wanted me to be there. I loved playing the liturgy. Pastor Sobers was a fine mentor. He taught me how to see the liturgy as fundamental to our faith and he was an expert on the details. It was later on that he said to me that I had been a liturgical organist all my life, and it was time I came out of the closet."

It was to Good Shepherd's good fortune that Herb accepted our invitation. He served as organist, choir director and Christian Education Director. He helped to organize many programs for youth and adults before his retirement.

# Member Spotlight



## Jayne Pfeuffer

Jayne Pfeuffer was born in Philadelphia. When Jayne was about 18 years old, she was in a German- American Club with her mother and aunt. A handsome young man walked in with his Air Force uniform on. That man was William George Pfeuffer. After getting permission from her dad, they married when Jayne was 19 years old. They married in a church in Philadelphia, which had services both in English and German.

They moved to Harrisburg for her husband's job. They lived on Brisban Street and joined Good Shepherd. Both of their sons, Ken and Alan, went through Sunday School and Boy Scouts at Good Shepherd.

After the house on Brisban Street flooded twice and her husband's passing away at the young age of 50, Jayne decided to move. She worked as an executive secretary at AMP, and several other AMP people were building houses on Chambers Hill, so Jayne had a beautiful home built there.

After her husband passed away, she had to learn to drive. Paster Hofer taught her to drive.

Her son , Alan and his wife, Anita lived by Zion, so Jayne started going to Zion.

As I was looking at all of her family pictures, I commented about her wedding picture and how beautiful it was. She then told us that when she was in her 50s, she met the owner of a modeling agency and started modeling! Next I commented on some of the art work in her house. She told us that she painted some of them! She learned to paint because she couldn't afford to buy artwork! "Amazing what you can do when you have to," Jayne commented!

She is now 94 years old. She attributes her long life to LOVE. She has had love since she was born. Arthritis is now throughout her body. She told me she may have to start taking minimal meds.

When asked what she would like the congregation to pray for, Jayne responded that she prays "that when the Good Lord wants me, I will pass in my sleep and that my son and daughter (in-law) will be able to have the life they planned on."

## Annabelle Saylor

Annabelle Saylor was born on Pearl Harbor Day (December 7<sup>th</sup>) in Lancaster County. She was baptized at Muddy Creek Lutheran Church.

While on summer break from college, Annabelle worked at the Wernersville State Hospital. Her normal ride to the hospital went on vacation, so she had to take the shuttle to the hospital one week. She got in the shuttle car, and a nice young man, who was employed at the hospital, got in the other side of the of the car! Thus developed the friendship of Annabelle and Bob! The first gift that he gave her was a book entitled , *The Psychiatry of a Pre-adolescent*. Their first date was to take residents of the State Hospital to a concert in the park. They dated five years before getting married in 1953. Bob went on to get his master's degree in Social Work, which was not a common degree in those days. Bob's work took them to several homes— Annapolis, Maryland; Wilmington, Delaware; Wellsboro; and Harrisburg.

While living in in Harrisburg, they were attending St. John's Church in Shiremanstown. Cathy was going to start confirmation, but it was too far to travel, so they came to Good Shepherd in 1968.

Annabelle taught high school for five years, and then stayed home while raising her children. When she started to work again, it was as the Christian Education Director at Good Shepherd. Then she went to work at Tressler Social Services, resettling refugees. Then she went to work for Keystone Social Services for about three years, and ended her career at Catholic Charities as an ESL Teacher. She taught students from around 30 different countries.

When asked what we should pray for Annabelle Saylor responded, "World Peace."

These were the headline stories from one day of NPR on my iPad. Now, add to this list the banning of books, a divided historical narrative of America and conspiracy theories. I'm going to use my racial justice training, my

baptismal affirmation, and my W/ELCA mission statement to try to understand what's been happening. Our ELCA is processing a Social Statement on "The Separation of Church and State." We need to learn more and maybe if there's still time, participate. We can read the draft and possibly share in some feedback. These social statement give us an opportunity to have voice.

Here's one man's story of how a "born and bred racist" became a bestselling Christian writer. Here are a few titles: *What's So Amazing about Grace*, *Where is God When It Hurts*, and his memoir, *Where the Light Falls*. Yes, it's Phillip Yancy. These are thoughts found in his article. It was 1964. He was at a 4th of July Patriots Rally Against Tyranny at an Atlanta racetrack. A Ku Klux Klan Grand Wizard, Governor Wallace, and others spoke while the audience waved small Confederate flags.

He came from a fundamentalist church where "colored" were concerned inferior because of the "curse of Ham." There were a few black men in he stands who started booing. With their fists and chairs and chants of, "Hit 'em / Kill 'em," he felt shame. It was a journey. He read *Black like Me*, met Dr. Cherry, a brilliant, black CDC scientist. He traveled the world and noticed the "Fear of the Other."

He mentions how the first missionary is found in Acts, an Ethiopian eunuch. He also says The Good Samaritan was not The Good Jew. He mentions the evangelical political filter, the right wing, anti-abortion, and anger happening in America. He also writes about our separate news sources, our biases, etc. His mission is to be a bridge person; that is definitely a good person to be for all of us.

He reminds us that EVANGELICAL means "Good News." I can remember discussions of whether Lutherans should stop using "evangelical." It was decided we would not. We would continue to be evangelical—to be a positive example.

It's a real challenge when being a Christian is often confused as being "Evangelical Christian" and now "Christian Nationalism." The other challenge is the various media platforms that blur the differences. I believe these voices and images are part of the reason some people don't "do church."

It was 2007. The Tenth Churchwide Assembly had as its theme, "Living in God's Amazing Grace: Thanks Be to God!" I was a first time delegate. We had pre-assembly meetings to go over needed information. We were also told about the Social Statement on *Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust*. We were told to be respectful. This was another opportunity to have those present give voice to their concerns, both for or against. Fortunately, everyone was civil and respectful. At the Eleventh Churchwide Assembly on August 8, 2009 the Social Statement *Human Sexuality: Gift and Trust* was adopted.

An amazing meeting happened at the 2007 Churchwide Assembly. We were in a huge open space where everyone was mingling. I found myself face to face with a gentleman, and we introduced ourselves. I said I was with W/ELCA, and he was Bishop Munib Younan, Bishop of Jerusalem in the ELC of Jordan, Jerusalem. We talked about the Augusta Victoria Hospital in Jerusalem. I had introduced a memorial to preserve the tax-exempt status for the hospital. It passed. During a breakfast at Zion, I had postcards that adults and children wrote to urge Washington to make this happen. It's a place where all three faiths of Abraham—doctors, nurses, staff, and patients are given healing and hope. That's living our baptism. He was focused on his passion for peace and justice. He was concerned about the chaos and harm that American Evangelicals we're doing in the Holy Lands. He couldn't understand our silence or our lack of concern. We needed to bring awareness and action to this danger to Christianity. I totally, agreed. I realized he mistakenly thought I was I was THE

WELCA. Unfortunately, I'm a WELCA. I have spoken, read, feel and now have written about "Evangelical Christianity" ever since. The conditions in the Holy Lands and what he warned about are present in America. In the Bishop's book, "Witnessing for Peace in Jerusalem and the World", he writes, "...the growing perception of Christianity is based on the actions and words of Christian fundamentalists and not on the teachings of the long-established churches." His warnings about the religious fanatic are powerful. He writes that a fanatic is a "person who has 'indoctrinized' his or her personal interests. Finding something from one's own political ideas or in one's own personality justifies this thinking to make it a religious ideology." Yes, "Christian Nationalism" seems to match that definition, and like the Bishop's conversation and book are a threat and can't be ignored.

Finally, in conclusion, Pennsylvania Council of Churches is sponsoring an event, "Christianity in America: Sacred or Supremist?" October 6, 2022 from 1:30 p.m. until 4:15 p.m. at Colonial Park United Church of Christ. You must register to attend.

When I visited the Pennsylvania Council of Churches at our old synod office building. I saw the chapel was open. I walked in and noticed that it's now The Parish Community of Saint Joseph of the Old Catholic Church. They are not Roman Catholic; they left in 1870's. They are welcoming to ALL. A framed quote on the wall says:

*We witness  
To mercy  
When we reverence  
The dignity  
of each person  
Create a Spirit of hospitality  
And pursue integrity  
Of word and deed  
In our lives*
